

## Chapter 5 Time Adverbs

First, study p. 72 in your book. Next, study each of the difficult time expressions below. Then, finish the sentences.

1. whenever = every time. (usually simple present, sometimes simple past)

Examples: Whenever it rains, I feel tired. (simple present)

Whenever I did something bad, my parents sent me to my room. (simple past)

- Finish:
- Whenever I have free time,
  - I always answer the phone whenever
  - Whenever my grandparents came to visit me,

2. ever since = same as since, but since a long time ago (present perfect)

Example: Ever since I was a child, I have loved chocolate.

- Finish:
- Ever since I was a child.
  - Ever since my mother and father got married,

3. as = while (usually used with past or present continuous)

Example: As I was doing my homework, I heard a big noise.

- Finish:
- As
  - As we were walking home

4. as/so long as = during all of this time (future)

Example: I will love you as long as I live. (I live = present because of a time word in the future)

- Finish:
- I will speak only English so long as
  - I will never forget you as long as

5. the last/next/first time = that time (past or future)

Example: The last time it rained, I got very wet.  
The next time I see you, I will return your book. (I see = time word in the future)

- Finish:
- The last time I took a quiz
  - The next time my friend visits me

6. as soon as / once = one thing immediately after another (past, present, future)

Example: As soon as class is over, I'll go to the library. (future)  
I always brush my teeth as soon as I finish eating. (present)  
Once he told me his name, I recognized him. (past)

- Finish
- Once the quarter is over,
  - I answered the phone as soon as
